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

#### MY PRAYER FOR THE CHURCH

By Mr. Larry Carter, GLCC president Ephesians 1:15-23



Family ties, though birthed in love, can become frayed. Differences that become disagreements that become disputes end up straining even the closest of relationships. Beginning with Adam's family through Isaac's then David's family the Bible is full of examples of what can happen to family relationships when what we think and feel becomes more important than who we are and what we share in common.

The Apostle Paul was very much aware of the difficulties incumbent in maintaining positive, healthy relationships in the family — especially in the family of God. His letter to the church at Ephesus was an attempt, in part, to convince his readers how central relationships are to living out the fullness of the Gospel.

He viewed these brothers and sisters in Christ as a permanent part of his life and that the responsibility for their growth and development didn't end with their baptism. He understood that Christians were family no matter where they were.

Paul considered it his business to help his brothers and sisters continue to grow and his prayers and this letter are indications of the depth of his commitment. It didn't seem to matter if a church was doing things right or not — he didn't write anybody off. He didn't decide that some of his brothers weren't worth the trouble — no matter how much they were in error. He knew it was his responsibility to help all those who were a part of the family of God to continue to grow in their faith. And so he prays for the church in Ephesus and, in effect, for every church throughout history.

Maintaining positive, healthy family relationships is one of the more difficult things there is to do. Being blood relatives doesn't guarantee that peace, love, and harmony will always exist. Our branch of believers knows we have a brother. Over the years a separation has developed. It wasn't deliberate. It wasn't planned. We simply began to see things differently. And the differences were deeply felt. Communication became difficult, painful — then practically non-existent. We became like distant cousins. Rationally, we both are aware that we are bound together by the common ties of parentage and historical origin. But, emotionally, there are still some who haven't figured out a way to overcome the issues that separate us. But by the power of God it can be done! As we understand the Father's plan for His children — as we see the purpose of our Brother's sacrifice — and as we know the unifying presence of the Holy Spirit — we can move toward a day when the issues that separate us will not loom large in the light of God's love. We can move toward a day when our love for each other will overcome our differences. No, not to become the same — but brothers. We serve a great God who called us out of darkness and into His glorious light. He has also called us into a family.

Paul prayed that the eyes of our heart may be enlightened. May that be our prayer as well.





#### MY PRAYER FOR THE CHURCH

"I want to say thank you to our brothers and sisters

from Great Lakes Christian College in Lansing for their work with our team in designing a wonderful weekend. We may not change the world in these forums, but we certainly have seen what can happen when we focus together on ministry. God blesses ministry." — Dr. Michael Westerfield

Larry and I were asked to share our vision for the church. As I prayed and wrestled with this topic over the last few months, I realized one day that the problem I was having with the topic is that no one really cares about my vision for the church. My only care should be Christ's vision for the church. There is a major difference in those visions. You see...my vision is colored by all kinds of history, teaching, and a worldview that are so far removed from the first century that any attempt on my part to cast a vision apart from Christ's vision is feeble indeed. I do know this: when we divide, judge, and control, we are not involved in anything our Savior established for His kingdom. I am moved by Jesus' prayer in John 17. Jesus lays out a vision for us that breaks down all barriers, that promotes a unity of spirit, and that calls us to be a witness to this world.

I want to share three ideas that I feel rise to the top in this second prayer of Paul in the book of Ephesians. First, we, I refer to the church, are part of a bigger family than what is simply here on earth. God's whole family includes both heaven and earth and He has given us his name.

Second, Paul prays for the church to be rooted and established in love. Paul has been talking about grace leading up to this prayer and now we see the fulfillment of that discussion in the love of Christ for us. Grace! Seems to me that Paul is praying that we better understand grace so that we can have the power as a church to minister to the world.

If we as a church allow a spirit of division, a spirit of judging, a spirit of meanness to direct us, can we take a message of God's grace to a lost and dying world? You see, Christ wants a church that understands grace because it is grace that fills us with the fullness of God and frees us to work together in the kingdom of God. Who are we to decide where grace ends and begins? I choose to leave it to God and get on with ministry.

Third, Christ's view for his church, as expressed in the prayer of Paul, is a church that recognizes Christ is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine when we connect to that power working within us. Working together brings glory to Christ and his church. Do we think we can bring unity through persuasion, through edicts from church hierarchy, or through our colleges and universities? We cannot, but God can and whether we want to recognize it or not, He is working today to pursue his will in marvelous ways.

I am not an expert. I don't expect people to always agree with me. But I do know that Jesus expects me to love the Lord with all my heart and soul and strength and to love my neighbor as myself. Jesus affirmed the Old Testament prophets' admonition to "act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." When we judge and promote division, I am afraid God is very angry. May we trust God to be who He says He is and to receive the power He has promised.



Paul and Cathy Kissling left for Vienna, Austria on January 6, 2005. They are now employed by Training Christians for Ministry International Institute (TCMI Institute) at the Haus Edelweiss campus. Dr. Kissling will serve as Professor of Old Testament and Director of the Leadership Formation Center. He has been teaching for TCMI Institute for five years on a volunteer basis. Mrs. Kissling will serve as Registrar. TCMI Institute has about 600 students from 20 countries. There are 10 teaching centers throughout the former soviet block countries offering

graduate level programs for church leaders. TCMI Institute is a member of the Euro-Asian Accrediting Association, but Paul will also help them qualify for accreditation with the North Central Accrediting Association for Colleges and Schools.

Dr. Kissling served Great Lakes for 13 years. He wore many hats during his time here including that of Professor of Old Testament. During his tenure as Vice President of Academic Affairs, he led the College to accreditation with the North Central Accrediting Association for Colleges and Schools. Under his leadership and the hard work of others, GLCC was allowed to skip the candidacy phase of accreditation and GLCC has been asked many times to be a model for other schools to follow in their endeavor to attain accreditation.

The Kisslings will be missed. We sincerely appreciate all the years they served GLCC. Great Lakes Christian College is a better place because of Paul Kissling's service.

Paul Kissling is not only a gifted minister, mentor, and teacher; he is a minister's minister, a teacher's teacher, and a mentor's mentor. He knows the heart of a Christian leader so well that he can resuscitate one that is dead, accelerate one that is flagging, and calm one that is beating uncontrollably. Paul has had his hands on our hearts for over a decade and his impact has been so profound that our current lives would not be recognizable were it not for his influence. We count it a privilege to call Paul both teacher and friend and we look forward to seeing what wonders God works through TCM because of Paul and Cathy's involvement. May God bless them in their service.

He served with the New York Christian Institute as Academic Dean and President before coming to Great Lakes. He was honored as an outstanding alumnus of Kentucky Christian College.

We have been blessed."

#### **EXCELLENCE THROUGH UNITY** (CONT'D. FROM PAGE 1)

Some churches have already been practicing the Restoration Movement principle of unity. In 2000, Meadowbrook Christian Church (MCC) began a Christian-based, fine arts day camp for students entering grades 4–12. The staff is comprised of professional people from several churches. It soon outgrew the MCC facility and needed to find a new location. In 2004, it became a joint effort between MCC and Rochester Church of Christ (RCC). The two churches take their union even further as a worship leader from RCC is occasionally brought in to lead the MCC praise team during the worship service. In 2003, RCC and MCC collaborated on the Christmas Eve Service that was held at RCC and attended by both churches. In addition, for past two years people from MCC and RCC have participated in the musicals and cantatas at both churches.

These are not the only churches to overcome their differences and cooperate on projects, but they are a good illustration that the two colleges hope to match.
