Elton Trueblood, in his book, "The Predicament of Modern Man," writes, "The terrible danger of our time consists of the fact that ours is a cut flower civilization. Beautiful as cut flowers may be, and as much as we use our ingenuity to keep them looking fresh for awhile, they will eventually die. And they die because they are severed from their sustaining roots. We are trying to maintain the dignity of the individual apart from the deep faith that every man is made in God's image and is therefore precious in God's eyes."

Anyone who has been paying attention knows that what he says is true. We are indeed a "cut flower" civilization. What makes his comments even more significant is that he wrote those words in 1944. It makes you wonder how much time we have left. No longer believing in God, man has determined that he is on his own to figure out what constitutes real life. The problem is that man, without the possibility of God, is coming to some wrong conclusions. Dostoevsky once stated, "If God does not exist, everything is possible." Paraphrased one could say, "If God does not exist, any self is possible."

In the book, "Habits of the Heart," sociologist Robert Bellah made an attempt to discover what Americans thought about how one should live. They wanted to see how the typical American determined his own personal ethics and values. (This is a non-Christian book whose only goal was to present their findings from a sociological point of view.) What they found was interesting. In talking to one man, who was representative of many they interviewed, it was discovered that while he kept referring to "values" and "priorities" it was not

justified by any wider framework of life purpose or belief. What is good is simply what one finds rewarding. If one's preferences change, so does the nature of the good. Even the deepest ethical virtues were justified as matters of personal preference. In an interview a highly educated woman was asked to sum up her sense of personal ethics to which she replied, "I just sort of accept the way the world is and then don't think about it a whole lot. I tend to operate on the assumption that what I want to do and what I feel like doing is what I should do."

The book concludes by saying that much of educated America has values that have little meaning. This is what the author says, "Values turn out to be the incomprehensible, rationally indefensible thing that the individual chooses when he or she has thrown off the last vestige of external influence and reached pure, contentless freedom." He is saying that we have come to the place in America where our freedom has no content and our values have no context. Yes, we are a part of a "cut flower" civilization. Proverbs 14:12 says it best, "There is a way which seems right to a man, but its end is the way of death."

Great Lakes Christian College exists to help our students build a foundation of faith that has both content and context. Now, more than ever, we need to do all we can to make sure that in our civilization there are those who know who they are and what they believe.

LIBRARY AND TECHNOLOGY

If you have not visited the Library recently, one of the first things you will notice is how technology is changing the way GLCC students and faculty are accessing information.

As can be seen from the mission statement of the Louis M. Detro Memorial Library (on page 5), we exist not only to support the needs of current students and faculty of the College but also its alumni and supporters. I strongly encourage everyone to take advantage of the resources available to them at the GLCC Library.

If you are able to visit our physical campus, all members of the public are permitted to use any of the Library's collection in-house and take advantage of our online research databases from the computers in the Library—just ask us for a guest login. If you are an Alumni Association member or if your local public library is one of the 300+ libraries that participate in the MichiCard system, you can check out books from us. The GLCC Library houses more than 85,000 items. Its book collection, nearly 60,000 volumes, includes over 20,000 full-text e-books as well as over 3,000 volumes in the reference collection. The Library also has a special collection of over 1,400 rare books, mostly in the area of Restoration Movement history and studies. The Library subscribes to 8,942 periodicals; 141 in print and 8,801 in full-text format through its online databases. The Library provides access to 42 online resources including journal databases, e-books, and subject-specific research programs. The Library also includes a media collection of over 1,800 items such as DVDs, videos, CDs, cassettes, and filmstrips.

If you have not visited the Library recently, one of the first things you will notice is how technology is changing the way GLCC students and faculty are accessing information. In the four years I have been the Library Director at GLCC, we have made many improvements. The Library has created a website to allow ease of access to online information sources. The computer lab has been upgraded to include 15 new PCs and one Mac as well as 6 new PCs in the Library lobby. Students can now access much of their reserve reading online in full-text through the Library's website as well as check on due dates and renew their books online.

The use of technology has also greatly influenced the quantity, quality, and quickness of interlibrary loans. The following table details the large increase in both books provided to other libraries and books received from other libraries over the past five years.

Books provided to other libraries have increased by 110% in the last five years and books received from other libraries have increased by a stunning 48 times the amount received in 2002. Not only do our students and faculty have access to over 85,000 items from the GLCC Library, but now they have access to over a billion items from libraries throughout the United States and they are taking advantage of this opportunity.

The Library has made a concerted effort to allow a greater amount of its content to be available online, 24 hours a day. To this end, over the past three years the Library has purchased over 13,000 full-text e-books that current students and faculty can access wherever they have an internet connection. The Library has also added nearly 4,000 additional online, full-text journals through subscriptions to additional online databases such as ATLA religion database, Oxford Reference online, Old and New Testament Abstracts, and Christian Periodical Index online. With the addition to the already mentioned course reserve readings available online, may students use the Library daily without even stepping through the Library doors.

If you are not able to visit our campus, you can still take advantage of the Library's website at http://library.glcc.edu. The entire holdings of the Library can be searched through an online catalog. If you find a book on our catalog that you would like to read, you can request that book be sent to you through Interlibrary loan from your local public library. Also on our website you can listen to past chapel messages going back to the early 1970s and view the new arrivals list to see what has been added recently to the Library.

Whether your interest is to learn more about the Bible, dig deeper into a theological question, or to prepare a sermon, we at the GLCC Library would like to help you with your informational needs. All the Library staff welcome you and we look forward to seeing you, whether online, on the phone, or in person to assist you in your endeavors.

he technology world has been advancing by leaps and bounds over the past decade. I am pleased to say that the technological landscape at the College has been continually improving over that time as well. Back when I was a student at the College, technology often meant overhead projectors and cassette tape players. The computers that were available in the Library ran on floppy disks and had green screen monitors — and we thought that was great. My, how the times have changed.

I officially took on the title of Director of Technology in the spring of 2003. Since then, the College has been actively and deliberately improving the technology on campus that supports the learning and working of both students and staff. The network itself has been upgraded numerous times to accommodate the more content-rich ways we use our computers. During the summer of 2006, we finished a complete upgrade of the technology center (something that didn't even exist before 2000) with all new computers and flat-screen monitors. The faculty received new laptop computers that fall to facilitate their use of technology both in and out of the classroom. The students benefited from this upgrade because the used laptops from the faculty became available for check-out in the Library — a service that has been very popular among the student body. Students can connect to the network via wireless connectivity throughout the campus, both in the administration building and in the dorms.

The College has also been improving the software and services that support effective learning. When I took on the responsibilities of network administration, we had two servers: one for the Library and one for the website. Our server room now boasts seven servers offering

services such as network security, web and email, online coursework, and online course materials from the Library. Thanks to our Campus Agreement with Microsoft, students and staff have free access to the latest operating systems and office productivity software. The admissions office, registrar's office, and business office are in the process of integrating their databases so that everyone has up-to-date information. Students can now check their grades and schedules online and will be registering for courses online in the near future. Many instructors now use our online learning system to enhance the classroom learning experience for our students with everything from discussion groups to quizzes and tests happening in cyberspace.

Of course, it is impossible to predict what technology will look like in the next five or ten years, but GLCC remains committed to providing the best learning environment for our students, whatever that may look like.





The College has broken ground on the new Doty Center. The foundations are already in place and erection of the metal structure started in mid-September. The Building should be ready for use by February 1, 2008.

I always thought Luke was the star of Star Wars. At least until I watched interviews with producer George Lucasinterviews that changed how I viewed both the storyline of Star Wars and the book of Ruth. Toward the end of the Empire Strikes Back, Darth Vader made the paradoxical claim he was Luke's father. I was skeptical, but it later made sense. Darth Vader, formerly Anakin Skywalker, would be redeemed. He would offer his life to vanquish the wicked Emperor. When this transpired I thought it was a mere add-on, but the interviews revealed otherwise. Lucas explains that his epic's plot actually revolves around Anakin's redemption. It was no mere subplot and, after the prequels are released, the waiting world would finally grasp Vader's centrality. Until then, in Lucas's words, "The real story hasn't even been told." Luke was not the star of Star Wars; his father was.

As Luke overshadows his father in *Star Wars*, so Ruth does Naomi in the biblical story. The book of Ruth is often read as if Ruth is *the star*. Ruth faithfully remains by Naomi's side, is rewarded by God with a wonderful husband, and gives birth to a son who becomes forefather of king David and Jesus. While this reading highlights important aspects of the book, unless it acknowledges Naomi's centrality, the real story hasn't been told.

One may often get to the heart of a narrative by noting how it begins and ends. Ruth is no exception. It begins with Naomi's loss of husband and sons. She considers this a deliberate act of God, saying: "The hand of the LORD has turned against me" (1:13). When she returns home, the women are mortified at her loss and Naomi asks them to address her by a new name, saying: "Call me no longer Naomi [meaning pleasant], call me Mara [meaning bitter], for the Almighty has dealt bitterly with me" (1:20). Naomi's complaints are not rhetorical flourish. They are the author's means of establishing the book's central crisis: Has God truly forsaken Naomi?

If Naomi's crisis is central, one would expect the story to resolve it. This is precisely what happens. Ruth remains by Naomi's side and soon meets and marries Boaz. These events are not narrated, however, so as to draw attention to Ruth. Instead, they furnish evidence that God has not forsaken Naomi and intends to restore her.

This is certainly how Naomi sees it. When Boaz graciously accepts Ruth, Naomi is not concerned for Ruth's love life. She focuses upon God's action on her own behalf, saying: "Blessed be [Boaz] by the LORD, whose kindness has not forsaken the living or the dead!" (2:20). Naomi believes God was providing for her by sending Boaz to marry Ruth. She realizes that through them the name of her husband (the dead) would be preserved and that she (the living) would be restored. Boaz agrees. He informs the townsmen that he is redeeming the land and marrying Ruth not because he found a beautiful woman but so "the name of the dead may not be cut off from his kindred" (4:5).

This reading is confirmed at the end. Notice what doesn't happen. When Ruth and Boaz have a son, they do not settle into a nice cottage to live happily ever after. Instead, the focus is on Naomi, to whom the townswomen say: "Blessed be the LORD, who has not left you this day without next-of-kin... He shall be to you a restorer of life and a nourisher of your old age" (4:14-15). Then Naomi takes custody of the child and the townswomen exclaim: "A son has been born to Naomi" (4:17). Naomi's friends even name the boy (4:17). Indeed, Ruth has all but faded from view.

We thus see that Naomi and Anakin share much in common. Incomplete tellings of their stories have diminished their rightful place in their respective dramas. While invaluable supporting cast members, Luke and Ruth were never intended to eclipse the true stars.






