"The hope, despite the difficulty, is in learning how to communicate. It is in entering into meaningful dialogue with others. Communication is one of the greatest needs of our day."

Reuel Howe, in his classic book, "The Miracle of Dialogue," begins with these thoughts, "Every man is a potential adversary, even those whom we love. Only through dialogue are we saved from this enmity toward one another. Dialogue is to love, what blood is to the body. When the flow of blood stops, the body dies. When dialogue stops, resentment and hate are born." He then states, "To say that communication is important to human life is to be trite, but that bit of triteness witnesses to an invariable truth: communication means life or death to persons."

Communication in any relationship is vitally important. Yet, it seems that despite our need true communication is one of the most difficult things we humans have to do. Some would say we are living in the "Golden Age of Communication." We are not. While technology has definitely raised the level of information it has done little to improve communication. All we have to do is look at the enmity and hate that exists around the world and we know the truth of what Strother Martin said in the movie, "Cool Hand Luke," "What we've got here is failure to communicate."

A large part of the problem in communication is our inability to look beyond preconceived ideas about issues and individuals. Whether at work, at home, or even in the church, communication is made difficult before anyone says anything because of who we are and who we think they are. I was watching an interview with Toni Morrison some time back. Morrison is an African American woman who won the Nobel Prize for literature in 1993. She's written the best sellers, "The Bluest Eye," "Beloved," and "Song of Solomon." She's very popular and a welcome guest on talk shows and college campuses. In the interview, she was asked about how she felt about "white people." She said, "I'd never trust a white person. The bottom line is—in the end they'd always sell me out."

While one can understand her comment I was extremely disappointed. Here was this bright, well educated, sensitive master of the skill of both oral and written communication making the kind of comment that only the prejudiced and ignorant would make. I couldn't help thinking that if the best and brightest among us can't see past their preconceptions and learn to trust each other, what hope is there for the rest of us.

The hope, despite the difficulty, is in learning how to communicate. It is in entering into meaningful dialogue with others. Communication is one of the greatest needs of our day.

Several years ago 20,000 young people were included in a survey in which they were asked a series of questions. One of the questions was, "If you could have something in your life right now what would it be?" One of the top answers was, "Having somebody to trust."

Its through communication that we can overcome prejudice, heal relationships, and build trust. It's no wonder that Proverbs 18:21 states, "Death and life are in the power of the tongue."



LC VIUPDATES

If you would like more information on how you can benefit GLCC through an IRA, please contact me (517-321-0242, extension 215) On August 17, 2006, President Bush signed into law the Pension Protection Act of 2006. Included in this Act are many provisions designed to promote charitable giving. One of those provisions allows you to give a gift to GLCC through your IRA. Here are the advantages of giving IRA assets to Great Lakes Christian College as suggested by the Sharpe Group, Give & Take, October, 2006:

- Those age 70-1/2 who make charitable gifts directly from their traditional or Roth IRA can do so tax-free.
- Donors may give all or a portion of their mandatory IRA withdrawals up to \$100,000 per year for 2006 and 2007. These withdrawals will count against a donor's minimum distribution requirement.
- Persons over 70-1/2 who are not able to benefit from itemizing their tax deductions can give directly from their IRA and achieve the same benefits as if their gift was fully deductible.
- Donors over 70-1/2 who are receiving social security income may make gifts directly from their IRA without increasing their adjusted gross income and possibly subjecting their Social Security income to higher levels of taxation.
- Those with retirement assets in other types of plans, such as a

401(k), may be able to transfer assets to an IRA and then make their charitable gifts.

This provision is limited to gifts made in 2006 & 2007. If you would like more information on how you can benefit GLCC through an IRA, please contact me (517-321-0242, extension 215)



SCHOLARSHIP.

Silence is not golden, it speaks. To fail to make a spiritual and moral connection is to communicate an absence of a belief system.

David Mills, in an article on training up a child, sounds this warning concerning how much the culture influences our choices:

"I think that many Christian parents are more modern than they realize, especially in assuming that knowledge of itself makes us good. Think, to take as the crassest example, of those many Christian parents of high-school students who drive their children to pursue the elite college, assuming that their

spiritual life will take care of itself." "Enchanting Children," Touchstone, December 2006, p. 21.

The real questions is this: What should be the purpose of that education? C. S. Lewis, in his 1947 Abolition of Man, addressed his concern that the educational system was beginning to debunk "truths," and that in denying "absolutes" it was in effect creating "men without chests" — men with no spiritual or moral absolutes to guide them. He was fearful that men driven by mere intellects and appetites would be the end result. We have in the last sixty years come a long way down this unhappy road:

"According to a UCLA study, although about 80% of college faculty describe themselves as "spiritual" and 64% describe themselves as "religious," only about half thought colleges should help students' moral development and fewer than one-third that colleges should be concerned with students' spiritual development. A majority of students (62%) surveyed in another UCLA study said that their teachers never encouraged discussion of religion or spirituality, nor even the meaning of life (56%)." Touchstone, (July/August 2006), 57.

Do we think Life's questions best left out of discussion, or that the business of college is to disseminate information in a moral vacuum? Is it not to teach truth, to inculcate virtues, to lead students into wisdom?

To study anything without seeing its relevance to the Godhead is to miss the more important lesson. And to pretend that it is not the business of education to address the questions of morality or spirituality is disingenuous. Silence is not golden, it speaks. To fail to make a spiritual and moral connection is to communicate an absence of a belief system. It is impossible to educate students without also indoctrinating them. Out of a fear of imposing absolutes on students who may be offended, education now mistakes the absence of an integrating

belief with some "higher ethic" of tolerance of all views by saying Nothing. In some sad way the universities value "silence is golden" over the "golden rule."

But there is no true value in the study of Art for Art's Sake, no Literature or History or Science apart from their ability to bring us into a greater awareness of the Creator Himself. The Creation sings His praises. And to study the Creation without heeding the song is to miss the message. To study History with no awareness of God working within, to ignore His Spirit moving in the hearts of men, is to miss the message.

What a quandary. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." And today's academics don't approach the beginning — either for fear of "meddling" in religious freedoms or from some fuzzy "separation of church and state" mentality. The consequence is a generation of college graduates who have yet to see the connection between their field of study and the Greater Reality.

Students learn both by reason and by Revelation. If in the very center of what our society believes to be the bastion of free thought, we ignore or avoid the most important thing, we are not educating. When we fail to make students aware of the Spiritual Reality, when we steer clear of God, His existence, His purposes, His expectations, His manifestations in History, His calling to all of humanity, then what can we expect except "men without chests," men who lack courage, morals, compassion, love, hope, purpose? And what is the value of this?

Don't parents want their children to understand the workings of the world around them, the workings of their own minds and hearts, to be wise? Apart from the Revelation, reason can take us only so far. This is why I am committed to a College which holds Scriptural Truth as its integrating power. For only in Christ, only in knowing Him first, may a person come to true knowledge, to wisdom.


