The Apostle Paul wrote in Romans 13:11-12 (Phillip's Modern English Version) — "...the present time is of the highest importance — it is time to wake up to reality. Every day brings God's salvation nearer. The night is nearly over, the day has almost dawned. Let us therefore fling away the things men do in the dark, let us arm ourselves for the fight of the day!"

Paul's phrase, "the present time is of the highest importance," has been true of every age. Each generation of Christians has had to face the reality that how they live and what they believe has eternal ramifications. Each generation of Christians has had to arm themselves for the "fight of the day." But, it seems to me that his words carry an even more important message for the times in which we live.

Our "fight of the day" not only involves the souls of men, but of our nation, and civilization as well. Carl F.H. Henry wrote, "Many of our generation is lost to the truth of God, to the reality of divine revelation, to the content of God's will, to the power of His redemption, and to the authority of His Word...The loss of that Biblical heritage means the loss of one's soul, the loss of a stable society, and the loss of an intelligible universe as well. The intellectual suppression of God in His revelation has precipitated the bankruptcy of a civilization that turned its back on heaven only to make its bed in hell." But lest we think that all is lost Henry closes with this thought, "Neither modern scientists nor modern historians stand a ghost of a chance of burying and bolting Jesus of Nazareth in a Palestinian tomb UNLESS WE SHROUD HIM THROUGH OUR SILENCE, UNLESS WE KEEP QUIET ABOUT THE WAY GOD ACTS AND SPEAKS, AND ABOUT THE SURE FUTURE TOWARD WHICH HE IS GUIDING ALL HISTORY."

We at Great Lakes Christian College understand the truth of Paul's words and the implication of Henry's observations. We understand the importance of what we do. We are in a fight that requires a resolve to do all we can to change the current trend toward godlessness. It's not too late. We believe we still have a chance to instill in our culture the values that come straight from the heart of God. We believe we still have the chance to train up the next generation to exhibit the virtues of a God-centered life instead of the vices of a self-centered life. We believe we still have the chance for our "present time" to know that God is not only the Creator, but also the Sustainer of life — real life, meaningful life, purposeful life. And for that reason we will not be silent, we will not be quiet. Every professor in every one of our classes knows that they are not simply purveyors of information, no matter how intellectual, but that they are proponents of a worldview that begins and ends with God. We know what our job is. Our task is to train up the next generation for the fight of the day.

Family Life Education is an interdisciplinary field of study that draws from various disciplines such as psychology, education, sociology, communications, law and public policy, economics, theology, and home management. It provides an understanding of human development, family systems, and interpersonal relationships.

# History

The History Major is primarily intended for those students planning careers in fields such as education, law, journalism, and government. It is also useful as a background for seminary studies, home or foreign mission work, and archaeology.

# **Christian Education**

The Christian Education Major is designed to equip the student for ministry in a Christian school or as a youth or education specialist in a congregation.

# **Christian Ministries**

Students in the Christian Ministries Major are provided the basic, specialized, and practical skills necessary for the work of the ministry.

# Bible/Theology

Graduates who have completed the required Bible/Theology major will be able to demonstrate a detailed knowledge of the contents and theology of the Bible and reliable approaches to its interpretation. These students will be able to express and live out a Biblically-grounded commitment to Christ and His purpose for the Church as well as communicate a coherent methodology for applying explicit Biblical teaching and illicit Biblical principles to real-life situations in the church and world. Our graduates are able to convey Biblical principles in culturally relevant terms.

# Psychology/Counseling

Churches and parachurch organizations increasingly turn to Christian counselors for assistance in meeting the needs of employees, members, and clients. Counseling in a Christian context can make a significant contribution to improving the life experience of individual Christians and to developing a healthier society. This degree does not lead to credentials in Counseling, which almost always requires a graduate degree.

# Interpersonal and Organizational Communication

The Interpersonal and Organizational Communication Major seeks to establish basic and specialized skills and attitudes necessary for the work of being a servant-leader in the church and world.

# **Cross-Cultural Ministry**

The Cross-Cultural Ministry Major seeks to build the basic and specialized skills necessary for the work of evangelism, both in the United States and in other cultures.

# **Youth Ministry**

The Youth Ministry Major will prepare students to minister to children and adolescents both in the church and world.

### Music

The music department at Great Lakes Christian College seeks to encourage the student to cultivate musical skills and talent. Students are given opportunities to understand, appreciate, and utilize a variety of musical forms, in several different contexts — worship, public performance, and for private enjoyment.

Two tracks are available to students, depending on their career interests and goals. The performance track is designed for students who, in addition to music ministry interests, may further their education beyond undergraduate work, and is broad and skill oriented, mirroring the requirements of a music major in most colleges and universities. The worship track is designed for students with interest in working within a local church in worship and music ministry, is practical and ministry focused, and reflects the needs of the church musician for the 21st century.

# **CAMPUS IMPROVEMENTS**






# NACCAP COLLEGE FAIR A SUCCESS!

**SCHOLARSHIP** 

Shifts, whether societal, economical, or attitudinal, are inevitable. Some shifts happen while we are expectant and we simply adjust our balance, others happen while we are still or unassuming and may cause us to tumble. An earthquake in Michigan would shock the nation and startle the residents. An earthquake in California is met with a simple sigh of resignation, a repositioning of things displaced and a resumption of life. Shifting takes place even in the Kingdom of God.

As a "professor" at Great Lakes Christian College, one of our roles is to prepare students to open themselves to the work of God in their personal development, to the work of God in their immediate context/community, and to fully participate in a historical work of God through Jesus Christ. This task is one that presupposes any one person's ability to know or have an accurate awareness of the work being done by God. It is a task that brings most of us to very serious time of reflection and prayer. As each of us who teach are humbled by that presupposition, we crave to partner in this historic task.

I have been reading in preparation for this new school year a series of books that I hope will continue to widen my view of the Kingdom of Heaven and help me grow with my students as we seek to be useful to God's work. One of the books that I truly felt connected to was a book by Reggie McNeal, The Present Future: Six Tough Questions for the *Church.* One of the thoughtful moments with this text came when the reader is challenged to see discipleship as a surfer sees a wave. Never once has a surfer scheduled a time to surf and planned the waves they desire to ride. Instead, surfers look for waves, monitor the conditions and then run off of the beach and into the water. The church and the disciples of Christ are those who are not planning what they will do for God, but instead are going to await the shifts in what God is doing around them and then run with passion toward those waves and ride them into life-changing ministry and direction. Seldom will those waves come to where we are...on dry land. They will, however, come and often we must go to

them. The task for each and every one facing ministry in these times and in this continually shifting paradigm is to prepare for the work of God that is coming in waves. McNeal says most think the preparation stage is dull and void of work ethic, when in reality, it is anything but that. What we each need to be doing is spending the gifts of our days and opportunities in waxing our boards, working on our balance, monitoring the weather for opportunities on the horizon, and then getting soaked.

I believe the church of Jesus Christ must respond, not to save itself, but to realize the power we have available to continue to be involved in the historic work of God's love and reconciliation. In a world seeking spirituality as a means to an end, rather than seeking God as the means to all purposes, hope, and joy, the church and those that are serving the greatest of commissions must begin to understand the futility of predicting and planning what God might do. Instead, we must prepare ourselves in faithfulness to go where God offers us some field that is ready for harvest. The viability and efficacy of the great commission is coming through in high definition clarity. The waves are coming and they are not meant to drown us, scare us or send us running to our safe, dry church buildings. The waves of God's redemptive work in history and in our lives are meant to be ridden to their full extent. The church and those ministering through it must prepare workers who are ready to work at every opportunity. The preparation being done at Christian colleges, in the local church bodies, in the homes of families dedicated to Kingdom life, in campus ministries, and many sundry places is to let God work in us to "prepare the way of the Lord" and then let those waves sweep us to places where faithfulness can grow and reap.
