We were informed that both site teams are recommending a ten-year reaffirmation to their appropriate boards. The preparation for the visits took almost two years of hard work. Many people were involved in the process but we owe a special debt of gratitude to Mark Christian for stepping up and leading the way. His leadership in bringing us together to accomplish a difficult task was exemplary. Dave Richards and Marie Riggs also deserve thanks for a job well done in not only preparing the report but also in making sure all the necessary information and accommodations were available. Marie worked hard in making our resource room second to none. Kate Blakely, one of our senior students, also assisted ably in helping to write the self-study.

This has been a remarkable year because we have had a record number of new students which led to a record enrollment. Lloyd Sharer, our Director of Admissions, brought a new energy to his department resulting in better quality applicants, better follow-up, and better relationships with area schools and churches. All indications are that the numbers will remain high for this semester. This bodes well for a probable new record for enrollment for 2008/2009.

I believe that years from now, when we look back at 2007, we will see what an important time this was for the legacy of GLCC. Together we have been able to move forward to position ourselves for a better today and an even more promising tomorrow.

Phase 1 (projected completion — February 2008) includes:

- a gymnasium to be used for intercollegiate and intramural sports. This will include locker rooms and an expansive foyer for a variety of uses.
- GLCC student athletes compete in the National Christian College Athletic Association, Division II; in basketball, volleyball, soccer, and baseball. In addition, the new building will allow for campus locations for intramural sports. Currently the College rents space for "home" games and other contests at other facilities.
- a stage for musical programs to spotlight the College's music and drama offerings, including concerts and plays.
- a community gathering area.
- a walkway spotlighting donors and other partners who "buy a brick."

Mark is the Senior Minister of the Memorial Church of Christ in Livonia, Michigan. Because of the major financial commitment to the Doty Center by the Memorial Church of Christ, the lobby will be named, at their request, in honor of Mark and Jeannie McGilvrey for their 35 years of service with that congregation.

I am convinced that you will be proud of the Doty Center! It's functional. It's practical. It's attractive. It will meet needs. Thank you to all who partnered with us in this great endeavor and we look forward to celebrating with you on March 2.

Every year the Alumni Association gives two scholarships to current students. Students must submit a completed Scholarship Application and FAFSA (Free Application for Fedral Student Aid). Selection of the recipients is at the discretion of the Alumni Association officers upon recommendation of the GLCC scholarship committee.



The Enduring Value of a Homogeneous Textile Reminder

Though commonly neglected, Leviticus teaches valuable lessons for today's Church. I would even say that the Levitical passage often deemed *least relevant* actually conveys a truth of utmost importance. Leviticus 19:19c reads: "nor shall you put on a garment made of two different materials."

You heard it: No polyester! But God cannot expect to dictate our wardrobe, can he? Somewhere, we surmise, Jesus must have negated this teaching. But he hasn't. Perhaps it was a scribal mistake, a later addition, or some other convenient textual anomaly. But it reappears in Deuteronomy 22:11. No—this passage will not go away. We must seek to understand it.

An instructive way to begin is to locate this teaching within Torah. God prepared Israel to receive his laws, saying: "If you obey my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my treasured possession out of all the peoples. Indeed, the whole earth is mine, but you shall be for me a priestly kingdom and a holy nation" (Exod 19:5-6).

What does "priestly kingdom" mean? Were all Israelites called to tabernacle duty? No, rather Israel was chosen to mediate between God and the nations. But how? For starters, they must be holy or set apart. There must be a discernable difference between God's people and others—a critical distance that allows the nations to see what Israel has to offer.

This call to be distinct frames the section of Leviticus wherein lays the prohibition against mixed cloth. Listen to excerpts from the beginning and end of this section: "You shall not do as they do in the land of Egypt, where you lived, and you shall not do as they do in the land of Canaan, to which I am bringing you. You shall not follow their statutes. My ordinances you shall observe and my statutes you shall keep" (18:2-4). And "You must not live according to the customs of the nations I am going to drive out before you...I am the LORD your God, who has set you apart from the nations...You are to be holy to me because I, the LORD, am holy, and I have set you apart from the nations to be my own" (20:23-26).

So why did Israel avoid wearing mixed cloth? Because God was reminding his people *daily* that his ability to use them to bless the nations required them to be different. This is not difference for difference's sake, but for witness' sake. God wanted to transform Israel's life through Torah and use her witness to woo the nations to himself. Moses highlights this function of Israel's laws in Deuteronomy 4:6: "You must observe them diligently, for this will show your wisdom and discernment to the peoples, who, when they hear all these statutes, will say, 'Surely this great nation is a wise and discerning people!"" The nations would not be drawn to dynamic preachers or creative programming but by the magnetic lifestyle of God's people.

The Israelites didn't mix cloth for the same reason they didn't cross-bread animals or sow diverse seed in a common field. Things that don't belong together shouldn't be mixed together. The Israelites wore one cloth to remind themselves daily that they were *not* their neighbors so that they may become God's witnesses to their neighbors.

Now what about us? Through the cross of Christ and gift of the Spirit, God has formed a people of diverse ethnicity, culture, and custom. The Church has thus rightly abandoned a uniform dress code. The NT teaching is equally clear, however, that when it comes to worldview and lifestyle followers of Christ must not mix with the world (e.g., Rom 12:1-2; 2 Cor 6:14—7:1) and that our witness is hanging in the balance (Matt 5:13-16; 1 Pet 2:9-12). So the underlying principle of Leviticus 19:19 is no less relevant. The Israelites had a homogeneous textile reminder, how will we remember?

Dr. Lloyd Knowles, Professor of History, celebrated three years preaching at the Elkhart East Christian Church in Indiana.


