itself in the twenty seconds before meals, or the 'now I lay me down to sleep' prayer before bed — I mean that I have been challenged to communicate constantly and wholeheartedly with a Savior I grew up knowing, but am just beginning to know. I have been challenged to read the Bible. Again, I am not talking about the half hour I spend reading for a classroom assignment — I am talking about being shown the wonder of God's words, of finally understanding why I should even care about the things it says. I am talking about a devotion to reading, studying, applying and obeying the Word. Most importantly, I have been challenged to change myself.

"When I came here last August, I was a Psychology major and convinced that I had my future planned out perfectly. It was not long into my first semester when I began to feel uneasy concerning MY plans for MY future. I began to pray and was led to make the decision to change my major to Cross-Cultural Ministries. I began to focus on what God wanted for the future HE has given me. I am going to be a missionary. I do not know where, but I'll go wherever God sends me. He needs to be the center of my life. I will no longer accept a life of which Christ is only a part."

A graduating senior, Jared Shouey, wrote,

"First and foremost, I would like to commend you and the rest of the faculty for the spiritual mentors that you have been to me. I am confident that this is true for many, if not all, GLCC students. There are many educational institutions that are able to provide quality instruction, but there are very few that can provide the training, through example, in how to become a 'servant-leader.' I feel it has been a privilege to be taught by professors who truly care more for your soul than your education. I could have graduated much faster by choosing a different college in the area, but I want to make this point very clear to you; when deciding which college I would attend, the faculty was the primary reason why I chose GLCC and why I remained there until I graduated. The eternal relationships that I built with the faculty at GLCC made it worth all the effort and financial sacrifice.



- Bill Lower, first graduate of GLCC, donated the first diploma given by the College.
- The family of Ralph Woodard (first president of GLBC) has given one of Ralph's Bibles dated back to 1951.
- A recent gift that I especially appreciate is a card catalog of commitment cards that Hervey Sewell, first Field Representative, kept to track donors of the College back in 1950.

As I flipped through the donated card catalog, I realized again the vision and generosity of many who believed that God wanted a Bible College in Michigan. Nothing has changed sixty years later. In fact, the need for GLCC is greater than it was 60 years ago. Christian higher education has tremendous value in our Christ-less culture. More than ever we need to train preachers and Christian workers for our churches and foreign lands. More than ever we need strong Christian leaders in the workplaces of America and around the world.

Our sixtieth anniversary celebration on September 18 will be an opportunity to celebrate the vision and generosity of donors today who STILL believe we need a Bible College in Michigan and in the surrounding region. Without the partnership of hundreds of donors, we wouldn't have been able to send out over 2,500 workers. Our graduates are serving around the world and we are proud to have them serving in the majority of Michigan churches. Great Lakes is your college. We are an extension of the local church committed to training workers to go out in the harvest field to bring more people to Christ. "Equipping for Eternity" is the theme relevant for our 60th anniversary.

Your financial support throughout the past few months has been a blessing as we continue to face the challenges of a weak economy. We are determined to not let the country's financial issues interrupt the progress of ministry training. We will continue to trust God, tighten our belt, keep our sights on the future, and work diligently at being the institution God wants us to be. Great Lakes started in 1949 with a vision to provide preachers and leaders for our churches. Charles Matthews, the second president of GLBC wrote in the KEY, May 1959, "May those who go from this institution be so zealous, so fervent, and so inspired that they may fan the fires of evangelism to take this state and the world for Christ." David Thelen, Professor Emeritus of History of Indiana University said, "The challenge of history is to recover the past and introduce it to the present." That's exactly what our 60th anniversary is about...recovering the past in order to introduce it to future generations. I hope to see you on September 18!







Campbell and generations after him identified theology as the problem in a divided Christianity.

Why Teach Theology?

A Bible College is a *Bible* College because every student receiving a degree has to take a major in Bible & Theology in addition to another major they choose. The study of the Bible, of course, and theology are specifically pursued in a number of classes-many of which I teach. Now if you know our history as a movement (the Stone-Campbell Movement) you know this has historically been "a problem" for us. Alexander Campbell was famous for saving that at the college he founded, Bethany College (WV), they would never employ a Professor of Theology (and they don't currently, at least). Campbell and generations after him identified *theology* as the problem in a divided Christianity. Hmmmn. So why do we teach theology at GLCC?

First, let's try to define theology. One of the older standard definitions is: "theology is the science of revealed religion." Note the telltale scientific label that identifies it as being modern. But even with that understood, it is unhelpful. Perhaps a more evangelical definition would be "the systematic exhibition of revealed truth." That is at least somewhat helpful. But we know that often the Bible is just not very systematic about many of its doctrines, so maybe that definition assumes more than the Bible offers. A simple but inadequate definition I have always liked is: "theology is thinking God's thoughts after him." It puts God in the lead; we hear him and follow his logic and thoughts. I like that. Perhaps a better definition is from John Frame who, in The Doctrine of the Knowledge of God, defines theology as "the application

of the Word of God by persons to all areas of life" (p. 81). This puts a helpful emphasis upon the Christian worldview, enlightened by Scripture, shared by fallible humans, informing all areas of life of God's will. I think that definition helps.

Second, we understand that theology has its detractors. Richard Dawkins, a contemporary popular atheist said, "What has 'theology' ever said that is of the smallest use to anybody? When has 'theology' ever said anything that is demonstrably true and is not obvious? What makes you think that 'theology' is a subject at all?" I'm confused. He sounds rather modern...and vacuous to me. But he is not alone in the atheistic choir. There is a growing vocal chorus of challenges to the faith once for all delivered. We must prepare to engage in discussion and defend the faith!


Third, I have always believed and tried to practice this maxim-theology is for the pulpit. By this I mean that true theology, good theology, is that which needs to be said so as to inform God's people of God's nature, will, and plan. We need less esoteric, ivory-tower theology that is only good for publication, and more biblically grounded, faithfully argued theology that can be preached so as to pour Christ into the heart of the Church. When we enter into the trialogue (the Word, the Church, and ever-morphing Culture) we will need to do more than merely quote verses, we will need to be able to present the whole counsel of God, coherent, as concise and as systematized as possible, integrated...and preached/lived powerfully!

Larry Carter Celebrates 10 years as President




