Despite the uncertainty of the times, despite the suspense, we, as Christians, know our purpose. We are to be a light shining in the darkness.

I don't like suspense. Whether it's watching an intense movie (give me a pillow so I can hide my eyes), following a favorite sports team (tell me about it when its over cause I'll jinx them if I watch), or witnessing some of life's vicissitudes (turn off the news, its too depressing), suspense is something I don't enjoy. And when it comes to my own life or the people I care about, suspense just about does me in.

When my wife and I were dating we were in a car accident that looked a lot worse than it was. At the time, I was the proud owner of a dark blue 1964 Corvair. While it was fun to drive, it lacked a vital characteristic — safety. The engine was in the back, giving you great traction during the winter months, but left nothing in front except a trunk that was as safe and reliable as a politician's promise. It was ready to collapse at the slightest pressure. We were in a head-on collision. My beautiful car was changed into a Pekinese in an instant.

I hit my head on the metal strip at the top of the windshield. Judy flew forward smashing the windshield and ended up in a ball on the floor. Glass was everywhere and red sticky stuff was on everything. My first thought was that Judy had crashed through the windshield with her head and that she was bleeding profusely. I frantically checked her over and while I didn't see anything traumatic, still wasn't convinced that I hadn't missed something. I was a near basket case when an ambulance came and took her away while I stayed to talk with the police about the incident. That half an hour conversation seemed liked forever. It wasn't until I got to the hospital and the doctors told me that she was all right that I

was able to take a deep breath. All she needed was some stitches under her chin.

Later we figured out what had broken the windshield and what all that red stuff was. She had been drinking a Barq's Red Pop at the time and when we collided she drove the end of the bottle right through the window showering the car with glass and soda. What wasn't funny just moments before seemed hilarious then. My head was thumping badly and when Judy smiled it pulled at her stitches, but we both started laughing anyway.

The economy has just suffered a head-on collision. What was thought safe and reliable was found to be neither. We are still in the process of checking out the well-being of all those involved. We are in that period of suspense between the shock of a crash and knowing that everything is going to be all right. Its not a fun place to be. Nobody's laughing.

But, despite the uncertainty of the times, despite the suspense we, as Christians, know our purpose. We are to be a light shining in the darkness. Someone once wrote that "light is best seen against the background of darkness" and I agree. If ever there is a time for Christians to shine it is now. We have an opportunity to show the world by how we live and how we give that our confidence doesn't come from healthy bank accounts and thriving stock portfolios. Our confidence comes from knowing the One who holds all things in His hands - our past, our present, and especially our future.





The sad part of this picture is that the "funnels" have been restricted because of fear generated by the slipping economy, and a lack of dependence upon God. - 2. We will continue to take care of our students, faculty, and staff. Salaries, health insurance, and retirement benefits are a blessing to the 40 individuals who work at GLCC. We are planning improvements in the residential halls and upgrades in equipment and programs for our students.
- 3. Extra effort is being made to govern and prioritize projects that could be major expenditures. We want to be good stewards of the resources God already sends to us, but we will continue to fund projects that result in growth.
- 4. We will continue to encourage individuals and churches to allow God to generously provide through them because the need to underwrite our ministry is ongoing despite the economic times.

We at Great Lakes are confident of our future because we trust in a God who "owns the cattle on a thousand hills." What can you do? Keep us in your prayers...send us your students...and *prayerfully* make GLCC a part of your stewardship plan.

You will find on page 11 a tribute to James W. Greenwood who was our fifth president. He died on September 27, 2008. His memorial service was at the Harris Prairie Church of Christ in South Bend, Indiana where he was ordained in 1943. We pay tribute to men like Jim who invested their life into the ministry of GLCC.




Bill's ministry career took him to Etna Green, Indiana (1953-1956), Colony Heights Church in Ft. Wayne, Indiana (1956-1969), Northglenn, Colorado (1969-1981), and Denver, Colorado (1989-1996) where he retired. He presently serves 20 funeral home locations in Colorado and provides funeral services, as well as officiating at weddings. In 2008, Bill conducted 289 funerals and 35 weddings. Joyce plays a major role in scheduling these events.

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Bill serves as a member of the Colorado Funeral Service Board, a Chaplain for the Black Sheep Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol, and has served as a trustee of three of our Bible colleges, including Great Lakes. He has also taken two trips to Southeast Asia where he conducted teaching seminars to church leaders for the Southeast Asia Christian Mission.

Bill and Joyce were struck with tragedy in 1981 when their only daughter, Christina, was killed at the age of 19 by a drunken driver. Bill stepped out of the pulpit for a few years and was employed by a funeral home. He returned to the pulpit in 1989 until his retirement in 1996. After six bypass heart surgeries, Bill's favorite verse is Psalm 73:26, "My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever."

Key scholar Ship

I acquired a book by Peter Kreeft, a favorite thinker of mine, entitled *Before I Go: Letters To Our Children About What Really Matters.* It is a book that you can pick up at any time in a busy day and spend a few minutes gleaning some insights from a man who has developed the discipline of observing the movements of God in everyday life.

One of the brief letters he wrote to his children really spoke to a quest I have been on as a follower of Jesus, father, husband, a faculty member at Great Lakes Christian College, and as a minister of the Gospel. It helps me focus on the calling on my life and, ultimately, the ministry I am involved in at our college.

Kreeft asks and answers powerfully the question: *What is the Big Deal about the Church?*

When I look at the ministry of Great Lakes Christian College, I take heart because it is not a static, rigid ministry that must rethink its core values to meet the needs of our students and the local church.

"Why is (the Church) so important? Because she is how we know Jesus. She tells us (by her teaching), shows us (by her saints), and feeds us (by her sacraments).

Why is Jesus so important? Because He is how we know God. He told us, showed us, and fed us.

Why is God so important? Because He is how we know love. He IS love.

Why is love so important? Because it's how we know happiness.

Without love, our happiness is not true happiness.

Without God, our love is not true love. Without Jesus, our God is not the true God.

Without the Church, our Jesus is not the true Jesus. (Pg. 43)"

As mentioned in my last Key article (Fall 2008), I desire with so many of you to find the balance between the changes in our culture, in people, and subsequently, in ministry to the local community and our clear mandate to share the hope found in Jesus. Often these changes come in such violent shifts in attitudes, beliefs, and values of the people we are ministering to that it is easy to get swept away by our aversion to these changes. We wonder if these changes can diminish the value of the transforming work of Jesus. These can't, they will never be able to and we can hold on to the hope we have. Our hope and purpose is based on the work of Christ and is renewed each day, is faithful, and will produce the will of God.

When I look at the ministry of Great Lakes Christian College, I take heart because it is not a static, rigid ministry that must rethink its core values to meet the needs of our students and the local church. With the economy on the minds of so many and with the state of the world pursuing so little peace and so much power, many are justly concerned. We read in our newspapers, see on our televisions and computers and hear commentators ask important questions like, "what does the future look like with such instability all around us?"

The purpose for each Christian and for the mission of our school is more solid today and more necessary than at any other point in all of history. People all around us are looking for something to offer them hope. Money fails us. Power is fleeting and when we do have it, it never satisfies. The love we are offered by the world is conditional and so we know we will fail to sustain its sources. So to teach this generation of leaders of the power of God's plan for mankind and to challenge them to offer that which lasts and which satisfies is something that has proven to meet the need of past, present, and future generations.

Let us be encouraged by this simple reminder...the church is our place to be accepted, loved, forgiven, entrusted, and useful. It is also the light to a dark world which reveals a God who became flesh and dwelt among us to reveal that hope. 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Academic Mentor



A Memorial Tribute

James W. Greenwood



On Monday, September 27, 2008, the fifth president of Great Lakes Christian College, James W. Greenwood, passed from this life into his glorious reward in heaven. While ministering with the congregation at St. Louis. Michigan, Jim served as a trustee of Great Lakes from 1951-1961. Later, after serving as the Executive Director of the Christian Restoration Association

and editor of the Restoration Herald (1970), he was called to the presidency of Great Lakes in 1975 and served through 1979. His work at the College was characterized by hard work with a heart for ministry and a mission to produce more preachers. Ed Erskin (BSL 1959), minister of the Northway Church of Christ in South Bend, Indiana, commends Jim's career in his memorial address as one of "patience, love, sacrifice, dedication, concern, discipline, scholarship, faithfulness, and unselfishness." His son Mike from Kokomo, Indiana, reflects, "His greatest legacy for me will always be the character and faith which he taught in both word and action...I have lost track of the number of times that someone from one of my dad's former ministries has told me that he was the best Bible teacher they ever knew."

Jim was a highly respected minister of the Gospel as he held ministries in South Bend, Indiana (1938); Moscow, Ohio; Buchanan, Michigan; Detroit, Michigan (South Redford); St. Louis, Michigan; Pompano Beach, Florida; Columbus, Ohio; and serving at Lake Worth, Florida before retiring in 1990. Jim was married to Jean who went to be with her Lord in 2001. Jean served with Jim as his secretary at the College. He is survived by two sons, Mike and Robert, and two daughters, Carol and Mary, and many grandchildren. He is also survived by his wife Anna (Martin) Greenwood.

Jim's leadership on the campus of Great Lakes elevated the passion to produce more preachers and Christian workers. He was an excellent preacher and exegete of the Bible which provided a wonderful example to the students who attended during his tenure. Great Lakes Christian College honors one of her faithful servants.


